Forest Discoverers having fun on Sugarloaf Mountain

Fall is upon us, bringing a bountiful community hike calendar and our Third Grade Native Plant Program, Growing Wild. I can't wait to be in classrooms and leading field trips again, connecting students with their native plants and the natural places of our island. Each year, this time with the students brings such heartfelt learning and rich forest experience.

Our Spring and Summer programs were more popular than ever. The Spring school program schedule was packed with Seventh Grade Watershed Discovery, STEM middle school hikes, and Growing Wild field trips.

Forest Discovery Summer Day Camp was greatly enhanced with help from Louisa Crowe and Dylan Fox. Our three day long adventures were filled with bat cave exploring, berry eating, journal making, water bug scooping, storytelling, small world creating, and hiking splendor.

Our new adult oriented program, Tracing Forests and Seas, was a grand success. The inaugural group of 12+ spent two amazing days in August drawing and writing together with leaders Kate Clark and Denise Crowe.

Community hike participants are at an all time high. Many newcomers continue to join our hikes, showing a curiosity and delight in the natural wonders of their newly chosen home. Many long term residents are also new attendees, finding the time to share in the joys of our forest and open to learning more with new friends.

The epic drought has softened a bit with an early September dose of deep rain. Yet weather patterns are forecast to be holding steady with a large El Nino effect. Throughout the year we have seen an advanced timetable of bud and bloom and fruit. Now, we see leaves falling before their time. Plant mortality is way beyond the norm, and I know I am not alone in wondering just what the future holds for us here. The fierce windstorm on August 29th was the strongest summer storm in our state recorded history. It brought trees and branches down throughout the forest and greater region, bringing with it an increasing sense of seasonal unpredictability. The Farmer's Almanac is calling for a hard, cold winter in our region. As we wait to see what plays out, be sure to spend some time in the forest, drinking in the Autumn light.

Our education program includes K-12 guided school field trips, Adult/Senior hikes, All ages hikes, Forest Discovery Day Camp, Ethnobotany and Nature Writing field seminars, a quarterly newsletter, and our two comprehensive school district programs; Growing Wild- native plants for all 3rd graders, and Middle School Watershed Discovery for all students in 7th grade. Our community hikes are free and no registration is required. Please join us this fall as we continue to explore and learn more about the ACFL together.

All Ages Hikes

Open to children accompanied by an adult, individuals, and small groups. Ideal for families, friends, and anyone ready to explore and enjoy our community forest lands with the safety and knowledge of a naturalist guide.

Whistle Lake Saturday, September 26th 10am until noon Summer has passed, but there is still plenty to love at our most beautiful and deepest lake on the island. This is a hearty hike, be ready to explore. Meet at the Whistle Lake parking lot at the end of Whistle Lake Road

Sugarloaf Mountain Saturday, October 10th 10 am until noon Experience the golden glow of Sugarloaf Mountain in October. We will hike from the dark woods at the base to the stunning summit view, enjoying every stretch in between. Meet at the trailhead on Ray Auld Drive at the bottom of Mount Erie just off of Heart Lake Road.

Bat Cave Saturday, October 31st 10am until about noon Come to the woods for a natural spook time that will help transition us all to the nocturnal season. Our annual bat cave exploration is fun for everyone. Costumes and flashlights are welcome. Meet at the Little Cranberry Lake parking lot on the north end of the lake.

Mount Erie Walkabout Saturday, November 21st 10am until 1pm We will finish off our Fall season with an extra long adventure. Be sure to enjoy a big breakfast and bring a snack and water. Trail #247 is official and complete, making a circumnavigation of our Island Mountains possible. We will begin at the base of Sugarloaf/ Mount Erie on Ray Auld Drive.

Senior/Adult Hikes

For any adult with a desire to learn more about our community forest lands through an easy hike in fine company, with a naturalist guide.

Ace of Hearts Creek Friday, October 9th 10am until noon Maple, willow, cottonwood, and mature alder bring abundant color to the season. This is one of the most deciduous areas of our forest, a real treat to explore in the fall. Expect a wide variety of mushrooms along the way. Meet at the Heart Lake parking lot.

Heart Lake Old Growth Friday, November 13th 10am until noon We have the best remaining stand of Puget Sound lowland old growth forest right here on Fidalgo Island in the heart of our community forest. Come along and experience the big old trees. Meet at the base of Mount Erie on Ray Auld Drive.

Whistle Lake Friday, December 11th 10am until noon

The hush of Whistle near winter solstice couldn't be farther from the madding crowd of summer. Enjoy our deep water jewel of the forest during the season of recharge, and feel the stored sunlight energy emanating from the green. Meet at the Whistle Lake parking lot at the end of Whistle Lake Road.






RECORD TEMPS AND DROUGHT...

HOW'S THE ACFL?

For those of you new to Anacortes, this summer must have seemed wonderful. Every day was like picture perfect sunny San Diego. We even had a fair number of warm evenings to sit outside in just a tee shirt and shorts. Normally, June is more like January and is often called "Junuary" and summer officially starts on July 20th, but this year warm and dry days began in May and stayed that way until September. Record high temperatures and record drought conditions were abound. The City of Anacortes even put into place a voluntary water ban on yard watering and requested that folks do their best to conserve water. A fire ban on recreational campfires was in place in June. Fire danger ratings climbed every day as the lack of rainfall continued until the end of August, when a violent storm hit Anacortes bringing strong winds and rainfall that mimicked a typical mid-winter event. Huge trees tumbled and many trails were blocked for over a week. This was not a normal summer...

With these harsh conditions, how did the ACFL hold up? What suffered during the drought and what will be the long term effects, if any? Well, a stroll along most trails will give a casual observer a glimpse of flora that immediately suffered. One can see sapling evergreen trees like Douglas fir and Hemlock with all of their needles brown and falling off, a sure sign that the tree will not recover. Even some older trees turned completely brown and are headed south. Areas around Mt Erie and Sugarloaf have large patches of dried up Kinnikinnick, Salal, and sword fern. I have observed the Salal and sword fern dry up and recover in the past, but this is the first time I have noticed Kinnikinnick suffer from lack of rainfall. It will be interesting to see how it does next spring.

But what you don't see are the things that may be more of interest. The percent of water inside trees became extremely low during the summer. As lake water levels dropped, wetlands dried, and lack of rainfall persisted, the ability for trees to take in and hold water diminished. Water loving trees like willows, alders, and cottonwoods really suffered, and the big wind storm in August showed their brittle conditions. Most of the trees that came down or broke in half during the storm were these tree species. Also, toward the end of July and the beginning of August, deciduous trees began dropping their leaves in a response to conserving the little water they had. Trails like 27, 22, and 200 near Whistle Lake were covered in leaves making it look more like a late day in October instead of July.

Trees can take a lot of abuse. Seeing wildfire burn scars on 400-600 year old Douglas firs south of Heart Lake is a classic sign that trees can live through a lot of environmental changes. Smaller trees however have a more difficult time, and when drought conditions occur year after year, the stress eventually takes their toll on these trees. Trees did suffer this summer, and depending on how much rainfall occurs during the years to come will determine the fate of these trees. For me, I am hoping for wetter conditions for 2016. Never thought I'd say that!



City of Anacortes begins purchase of 40 acres adjacent to ACFL!

The City has entered into a purchase agreement with the owners of a 40-acre parcel of land flush with the south border of the Heart Lake area. This undeveloped acreage is known as the Van Buren/McLean property. The acquisition will ensure the continuation of exceptional wildlife and habitat value and function for the ACFL. Revenue from the City contract with Lakeside Industries (currently mining rock on leased ACFL land) has been used to initiate the purchase. The City will continue to make payments over the next year and a half as they pursue grants from conservation foundations to help offset the cost and allow for the possible purchase of more land adjacent to the ACFL in the future.
